Neighborhood House History

- 1906 – The National Council of Jewish Women opened Settlement House offering classes to immigrants in English, U.S. Citizenship, sewing and music.
- 1916 - Settlement House changed to it's name to the Educational Center and eventually to Neighborhood House, increasing the services it offered to residents of the Central District.
- 1956 - Neighborhood House locates to Yesler Terrace and begins a new chapter of service to the public housing communities in Seattle and King County.

Neighborhood House Programs

- Early Childhood Services:

- Head Start, Early Head Start, Parent-Child Home Program; helping children start school ready to learn through literacy focused-early education classes.

- Tutoring and Youth Programs:

- After-school and summer programs helping low-income youth and their families succeed in school and life.

- Family and Social Services:

- Case management services for seniors, immigrants, refugees, and families focused on self-sufficiency.



Neighborhood House Programs

- Job Training:

- Job training, placement and support to get unemployed or under-employed individuals into good jobs.

- Transportation:

- Door to door para-transit services for the frail elderly and disabled.

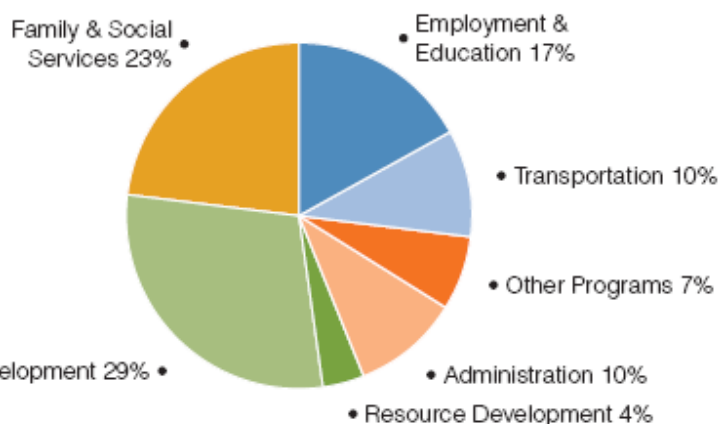
- Community Health:

- Education and prevention programs addressing health issues facing low-income communities and other marginalized populations.

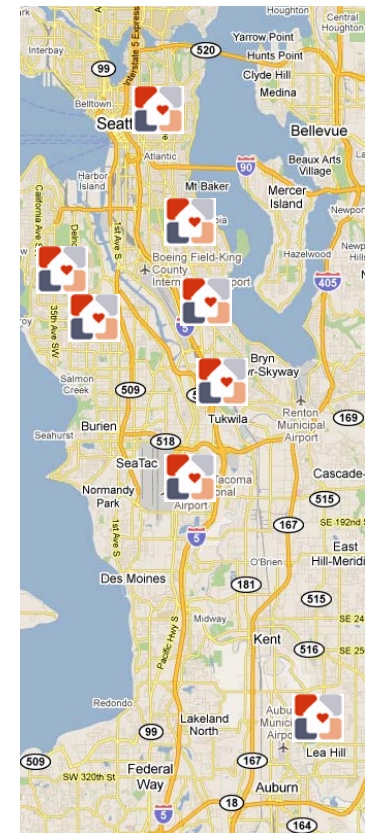

Our services for our elders are designed to:

- Help our elders remain independent.
- Reduce barriers to services.
- Reduce instances of poverty and homelessness.
- Reduce Isolationism.
- Education.

Demographics

- In 2010 we served 1,110 clients who were seniors or people with disabilities.
 - African American – 147 (13%)
 - Asian – 421 (38%)
 - East African – 252 (23%)
 - Latino – 24 (2%)
 - Multiracial – 17 (2%)
 - Native American/Alaskan – 21 (2%)
 - Pacific Islander – 13 (1%)
 - Unknown – 83 (7%)
 - White – 132 (12%)



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What we do for our elders

- Our primary service is to help our elders access services:
 - Senior Services
 - Home Care Services
 - Medicaid
 - Medical Care
 - Utility Assistance
 - Wellness Activities
 - Congregate Meals



What we do for our elders

- We also:
 - Help pay for medical supplies when insurances or Medicaid won't;
 - Provide low intensity bilingual/bicultural case management;
 - Transport seniors to doctors appointments and other medical related activities; and
 - Organize congregate activities.

Short-Term Solutions

- Assess the clients situation
- Address the immediate concerns that threaten the basics of independent life: eviction, utility shut off, food, income, health, etc.
- Link client with NH program, service or outside provider to solve immediate issue
- Develop a case plan to asses and address underlying factors that inhibit client's independence

Long-Term Support

- Provide case management services to monitor clients progress towards goals
- Enroll client in health and wellness activities
- Provide financial counseling to budget meager incomes
- Mentor and provide emotional support
- Link clients with needed services and remove barriers to these services
