Learning Activity

Presentation from Angela Miyamoto, ADS Planner, on the Collaborative Funding Process, a new approach to investing in our community and addressing racial equity.

- Overview of [Community Living Connections](#) and Family Caregiver Support programs – a network of providers that help older adults, people with disabilities, and caregivers live independently in the community by connecting people to programs and services and providing individual consultation and support.
- Primary access number for the network, 1-844-348-5464, is answered by Crisis Connections, the agency that also operates 2-1-1. The Community Living Connections line is specifically for aging and disability issues; 2-1-1 is more general human services info. Current call volume – somewhere around 10,000 contacts per month.
- People can access info via phone, email, website, and in person through the network of providers listed on the website.
- Amanda asked if providers were familiar with the CARE Act, legislation passed in 2016 to help family caregivers with the transition from hospital to home for their loved ones. Angela will follow up.
- Providers track information about issues people are facing and what referrals they made. This information is reported to ADS.
- ADS will pilot a Collaborative Funding process for 2020 contracts for this service area. The process differs from traditional RFP funding process in that it is more cooperative and inclusive. ADS is piloting this model with the hope that it will move us closer to race and social justice goals.

Presentation from Milica Veselinovic - Overview of City of Seattle's Race and Social Justice Commitment – commitment to eliminate racial disparities and achieve racial equity.

- Racial disparity – looking at how race impacts people's experiences in our community. Adjusting for other factors, race is the biggest factor in how we fare.

- The city is committed to leading with race and also considering the impact of other identities. Start with race to focus our efforts, impact the place where the biggest disparities are.
- Equality vs. equity. Equality means everyone gets the same, equity means everyone gets what they need to work with the barriers and conditions in place. Liberation might look like having no barriers at all.

Notes from the small groups will be gathered and discussed at the September Age Friendly Steering Committee meeting. We hope to bring a couple of actionable next steps back to the Coalition from this work at our next meeting in October. A few of the group's great ideas include:

- Rotating the day/time/location of our meetings, including meeting at community locations in different neighborhoods.
- Training Coalition members to be ambassadors for Age Friendly, including developing our elevator pitches to have at the ready.
- Partnering with the Department of Neighborhoods Community Liaisons to bring new voices into Age Friendly.

Working Groups and Committee Updates:

- **Outreach, Advocacy and Communications**
Meeting immediately after this meeting (info below). Committee has been deciding on a project together, proposal to have the project be the planning for next Age Friendly Coalition meeting to be a Pike Market street design assessment walk, like the one done with visiting AARP staff in June.
- **Social and Civic Participation**
The last meeting was cancelled and rescheduled to 8/31 (info below). Joanne has cross-referenced the action items in the Seattle Age Friendly Action Plan with the group's project ideas and created a document with the results. The workgroup will review at the next meeting on the 31st and decide on next steps.

- **Transportation and Public Spaces**

The committee continues to move forward on their neighborhood project and has tentatively decided to work in both South Park and Beacon Hill. A draft problem statement is in the works, which will describe the project intent, help define roles of committee members, and give members talking points for outreach to community groups and other potential partners.

- **Housing**

First meeting of the Housing Workgroup is planned for Wednesday, 8/29, 1:00-2:30PM in SMT 5882. Please join us if you are interested. We will be looking at the housing-related actions in the Age Friendly Action Plan, as well as the recommendations and suggested actions from the recent WASU housing report.

- **Steering Committee**

- Reminder that Steering Committee is “Responsible for developing guidelines for operations and structure of the Coalition, including the roles and expectations of its members, meeting agendas, and goals.” All are welcome, but a core group of committed members is needed to do this work. Please contact [Maria Langlais](#) if you would like to receive a calendar invite.
- Proposal to do a Pike Market walking assessment as our October Coalition meeting. This would be a similar event to what was done in June with visiting AARP staff, using the Stanford app to assess the age and disability friendliness of the Market. Would be good to have a space for a business meeting afterwards on the same date, or another date. Amanda investigated with the market staff, and October 19 could work.
- Seattle Age Friendly Action Plan update: all goals have been vetted, assessed with the Results Based Accountability framework. Looking at the possibility of hosting a kick-off event to launch the Action Plan, possibly this fall.
- Discussion on expanding our table, process for reaching out to those who we want to be part of our coalition.
- Possibility of merging with/working more closely with the Healthy Aging Partnership.
