

Helping People with Hearing Loss in Senior Centers, Nursing Homes, Adult Family Homes, and Assistive Living Facilities

Daily Communication

One-to-One Settings

- Use a personal amplifier, like a Pocket-talker, if the person lacks hearing aids
- Move away from background noise, including other conversations, if possible.
- Use a portable counter loop.
- Use a remote microphone or a proprietary hearing aid accessory, if the individual has one
- Use a caption app, like AVA or google live transcribe, on a smartphone or tablet.

Events and Large Group Settings

- Use microphones, PA systems, and hearing loops or other assistive listening technology for all events and activities.
- Seat people with hearing loss close to the front of the room or to the group leader.
- Provide captions for presentations; use live Communication Access Realtime (CART) or automatic captions in PowerPoint or other apps.
- Turn on the captions for movies and videos, always.
- Turn on captions for Zoom meetings, teleconferences, presentations, and webinars.
- Provide counter hearing loops at information desks and where information is exchanged.
- Attend—and encourage others to attend—our online hearing loss support meeting, HOPE.

Creating a Hearing-Friendly Community

- Become familiar with basic hearing aid functions, buttons, maintenance, and changing batteries.
- Tell others about captioned telephones.
- Follow safe hearing instrument storage procedures. Have extra batteries available.
- Residential facilities: Arrange for a hearing professional to visit once per month to adjust hearing aids for free.

NOTE: Many of the above suggestions will also be useful for people with hearing loss living at home

Prescription Hearing Aids

- Can help many seniors hear and communicate better.
- Require an exam from a hearing professional; will need professional follow-up and maintenance.
- Frequently require time and practice to ensure they work well for an individual.
- Can be adjusted or reprogrammed.
- Require regular maintenance and cleaning.
- Perform best within a limited range of six feet.
- Used alone, may not be enough.

Over-The-Counter (OTC) Hearing Aids

Designed for people aged 18 or older with perceived mild to moderate hearing loss.

- Mainly available online but may be found at Walgreens and Best Buy.
- May be difficult for seniors to set up by themselves.
- Available without a hearing exam, but an examination from a hearing professional is recommended and is often available free.
- May or may not be readjusted or reprogrammed.
- Frequently may require time and practice to ensure they work well.
- Require maintenance and cleaning.
- Perform best in range of six feet. Used alone, may not be enough.
